Dear Sirs:

The Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) enforces regulations in order to protect the health and care of animals, plants, and agricultural industry. Violations of these regulations jeopardize the animal and plant health systems that are vital to protect American agriculture.

Our investigation shows that you have violated Federal Regulations as described on the enclosed Civil Penalty Stipulation Agreement form. APHIS regulations provide for administrative and criminal penalties to enforce these regulatory requirements. The amount of the monetary penalty, or possible criminal charges, depends on the number and severity of the violations.

The Secretary of Agriculture may assess a civil penalty for such violations after notice and an opportunity for a hearing. However, you may waive your right to a hearing and settle this matter by paying the \$10,765 and signing and returning the **agreement form**. You may voluntarily accept this reduced agreement to avoid further action.

Please pay the civil penalty by certified check or money order made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Write the Case Number (NY05111-AC) on your check or money order and mail it with the signed agreement form to:

Dear Mr. Connors:

I have prepared the following comments in response to your telephone request of August 31, 2005:

1. Since April 1993 I have served as the Director of the Rosamond Gifford Zoo at Burnet Park. Since 1996 I have also served as the Executive Director of the Friends of the Rosamond Gifford Zoo at Burnet Park, Inc., a 501c-3 organization, which serves as the fund-raising arm of the Zoo. I function as the CEO for the Zoo and my responsibilities include oversight of all aspects of Zoo operation including Animal Collections, Facilities, Visitor Services, Development, Marketing, Public Relations and Education. I am responsible for developing the annual operating budget for the Zoo and managing within that budget. Together the County and the Friends employ approximately 50 full time staff, with an additional 40 staff hired on a part-time and/or seasonal basis.
2. The Zoo is owned and operated by Onondaga County, under the auspices of the Department of Parks and Recreation. Approximately 50% of our annual operating budget comes from Onondaga County. Admissions account for 16% of our budget, philanthropic donations and revenues earned through gift shop and food concessions make up the remaining 34%.
3. You asked for my opinion on the incident of the elephant calf's death. I believe it was a tragic accident. Our previous experience with the adult females and with the four calves that have been born here has been that the adult females successfully prevented the calves from entering the water and/or retrieved them quickly and calmly when they did. With the exception of the first calf, who had medical problems when he was born and was not allowed outside for several weeks, all of our calves have gone outside and into

this exhibit within the first day or two of birth. The calf that died was five days old when he died, and had been out on the exhibit for two days prior to the day he died. The four females in the herd were being extremely protective of the calf, consistently keeping him in the center of the group. When he darted underneath one of the females and fell into the pool he was in the shallow end. He could easily have stood on one of the top two steps and had most of his body above water had not the two adult and two juvenile females all gone into the pool after him, thereby pushing him into deeper water. Admittedly we failed to anticipate the intensity with which the two juvenile females especially reacted. It is my belief that, had the juveniles not reacted by immediately rushing into the pool, the calf's mother would have used her trunk to help him out, as she had done on a previous occasion with another calf. I believe it is a credit to our staff and to their training and handling practices that they were able to call the other females out of the pool and go in to retrieve the calf.

4. Future precautions. Efforts here fall into two categories. The first entails physical modifications to the exhibit pool. Our goal is to continue to provide access to water, and to prevent a young calf from ever being in more than 1-2 feet of water. To achieve this will require that we implement temporary modifications to the exhibit, to be put in place when we have a young calf. To that end, we have met with a structural engineer, taken him through the exhibit, discussed the design criteria with him, and provided him with blueprints of the exhibit yard and pond. He is aware that the project must be completed before the next calf is due next Spring.

The second precaution will be an exhaustive discussion of possible scenarios that might arise during the management of new elephant calves. Those discussions will include myself, the General Curator, the Veterinarians, the Elephant Manager and all of the elephant staff. We will address not only physical issues, such as exhibit design, but also such aspects as group composition at the time of the calf's birth. We will review each management option, try to identify possible problems, and develop solutions to the problems and/or alternative management strategies.

It is still too close to the recent death to review it in detail with staff. However, when time has lessened some of the pain, and in some instances guilt, that staff are feeling we will be going over the incident, what happened, and what we might have done differently. We can, and will, learn from the incident, and we will apply what we have learned to the management of future elephant calves.

I believe that I have addressed all of the questions that you raised. If I have not please let me know and I will provide whatever additional information you require.

HANDLING OF ANIMALS.**

Handling of all animals shall be done as expeditiously and carefully as possible in a manner that does not cause trauma, overheating, excessive cooling, behavioral stress, physical harm, or unnecessary discomfort.

*** This was a focused inspection on the Elephant compound and exhibit area, following the death of a five day old calf. A review of the handling procedures following this incident should be addressed. It was stated that previously an elephant calf had gone through keepers guarding the pool, and went into the water. At that time the mother was able to pull the calf safely out of the water. Due to the previous incident and the death of the most recent calf, it should be noted that a more substantial barrier needs to be in place to restrict access to the pool. This needs to be addressed for the safety of the handlers and the animals.

FACILITIES, GENERAL.**

Structural strength. The facility must be constructed of such material and of such strength as appropriate for the animals involved. The indoor and outdoor housing facilities shall be structurally sound and shall be maintained in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals.

*** Around the exhibit yard, chains are added to provide additional protection, so a young elephant cannot get through the Ballards into the demonstration yard. Currently there is no way to block a calf from getting into the pool. (The pool is 8 feet at the deepest point). Subsequently, they calf broke away from the herd he was with and went into the pool. He later died due to complications. A method must be devised to make the pool a safe area for future elephant calves. This can be accomplished by blocking access to the pool, or devising a way to block access to deep areas of water. This needs to be addressed by the birth of the next calf, for the safety and health of the animal.

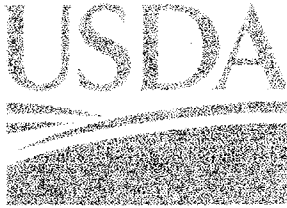

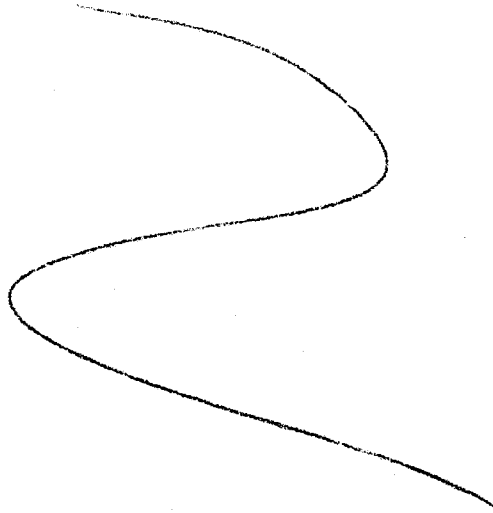

On the morning of April 12, 1994, zoo personnel found a 700 lb lion dead. This animal had been attacked by dogs during the night of 4/11/94. Later in the morning 4/12/94, zoo staff saw 2 dogs in the zoo where they were upon the animal that killed the lion. These dogs are big mix approximately 70-75#. Staff attempted to capture the dogs to no avail & they escaped through a hole in the fence. Since the incident, the zoo has identified where the dogs entered & exited the zoo and there are now fence repairs in place to prevent these dogs from entering the zoo. Additionally, the zoo has contacted the local animal control and there is an agreement for the animal control to come on a priority of stray dogs on farms in the park adjoining the zoo.

Finally, the zoo staff had an emergency meeting to determine how to improve the perimeter fencing gate to keep people out of the zoo & they are still working on the plans to accomplish this.

During today's inspection, the repaired areas were visited & several other fence areas that need modification and/or repair to prevent entrance of predators. All areas except one were repaired on the spot or a job order repair made. These areas include the main delivery gate, the elephant entry gate, & the gate behind the main area of the zoo. A fence 4' long in the poplars parking area.

The area still requiring modification to prevent the entry of predators is the elephant gate area. This gate the fence needs to be modified to prevent the entrance of predators and prevent injury to animal exhibit.

The above can be a long term correction until a more permanent solution is pursued.
